



# Triumph Doublefile Viburnum Viburnum plicatum 'Trizam'

## **Description:**

A spectacular shrub when in bloom, covered in beautiful balls of snowy white flowers in spring, an outstanding selection; attractive dense branching on a compact plant that is quite adaptable and low maintenance

#### **Ornamental Features**

Triumph Doublefile Viburnum is covered in stunning cymes of white round flowers held atop the branches in late spring. It has dark green deciduous foliage. The serrated pointy leaves turn an outstanding brick red in the fall.

### **Landscape Attributes**

Triumph Doublefile Viburnum is a multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with an upright spreading habit of growth. Its average texture blends into the landscape, but can be balanced by one or two finer or coarser trees or shrubs for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. Deer don't particularly care for this plant and will usually leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Triumph Doublefile Viburnum is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Mass Planting
- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use

#### **Planting & Growing**

Triumph Doublefile Viburnum will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 6 feet. It has a low canopy, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 40 years or more.





This shrub does best in full sun to partial shade. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
