Description:

A new late spring-flowering shrub which features showy pink trumpet-shaped flowers held over attractive golden variegated foliage, attracts hummingbirds; somewhat coarse and open in habit, good as a color accent for general garden use; needs full sun

Ornamental Features

Sunny Princess Weigela features showy clusters of pink trumpet-shaped flowers with lavender overtones along the branches in late spring. It has attractive green foliage with hints of yellow. The pointy leaves are highly ornamental but do not develop any appreciable fall color.

Landscape Attributes

Sunny Princess Weigela is a multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with a shapely form and gracefully arching branches. Its relatively coarse texture can be used to stand it apart from other landscape plants with finer foliage.

This shrub will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. It is a good choice for attracting hummingbirds to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Sunny Princess Weigela is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Mass Planting
- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use

Planting & Growing

Sunny Princess Weigela will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 6 feet. It has a low canopy, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years.

Plant Finder

It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
