





Chippewa Viburnum Viburnum 'Chippewa'

Height: 8 feet Spread: 9 feet

Description:

A large semi-evergreen shrub with multi-season appeal; showy clusters of creamy white flowers in early spring, brilliant red fruit from August through early winter, and good fall color; best planted with its counterpart Huron to ensure good fruit set

Ornamental Features

Chippewa Viburnum features showy clusters of lightly-scented creamy white flowers at the ends of the branches in mid spring, which emerge from distinctive rose flower buds. The dark red fruits which fade to black over time are held in abundance in spectacular clusters from late summer to late fall. It has dark green evergreen foliage. The textured round leaves turn outstanding shades of scarlet and in the fall, which persists throughout the winter.

Landscape Attributes

Chippewa Viburnum is a multi-stemmed evergreen shrub with a more or less rounded form. Its average texture blends into the landscape, but can be balanced by one or two finer or coarser trees or shrubs for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. It is a good choice for attracting birds to your yard, but is not particularly attractive to deer who tend to leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Chippewa Viburnum is recommended for the following landscape applications;





- Accent
- Mass Planting

Planting & Growing

Chippewa Viburnum will grow to be about 8 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 9 feet. It has a low canopy, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 40 years or more. This variety requires a different selection of the same species growing nearby in order to set fruit.

This shrub does best in full sun to partial shade. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
