A very attractive medium sized dessert apple with good flavor; chartreuse-green flushed in scarlet; needs a second pollinator; ideal for home landscapes, needs well-drained soil and full sun

Edible Qualities

Scarlet Pippin Apple is a medium-sized tree that is commonly grown for its edible qualities. It produces chartreuse round apples (which are botanically known as 'pomes') with a scarlet blush and white flesh which are usually ready for picking from early to mid fall. The apples have a sweet taste and a crisp texture

The apples are most often used in the following ways:

- Fresh Eating
- Cooking

Features & Attributes

Scarlet Pippin Apple features showy clusters of fragrant white flowers with shell pink overtones along the branches in mid spring, which emerge from distinctive red flower buds. It has forest green deciduous foliage. The pointy leaves turn yellow in fall. The fruits are showy chartreuse apples with a scarlet blush, which are carried in abundance from early to mid fall. The fruit can be messy if allowed to drop on the lawn or walkways, and may require occasional clean-up.

This is a deciduous tree with an upright spreading habit of growth. Its average texture blends into the landscape, but can be balanced by one or two finer or coarser trees or shrubs for an effective composition. This is a high maintenance plant that will require regular care and upkeep, and is best pruned in late winter once the threat of extreme cold has passed. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Messy
- Disease





Aside from its primary use as an edible, Scarlet Pippin Apple is sutiable for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Shade
- Orchard/Edible Landscaping

Planting & Growing

Scarlet Pippin Apple will grow to be about 25 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 25 feet. It has a low canopy with a typical clearance of 4 feet from the ground, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 50 years or more. This variety requires a different selection of the same species growing nearby in order to set fruit.

This tree is typically grown in a designated area of the yard because of its mature size and spread. It should only be grown in full sunlight. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
