



## **Persian Lilac** *Syringa x persica*

Height: 8 feet

Spread: 10 feet

### **Description:**

A beautiful shrub covered in upright panicles of sweetly fragrant lilac-sky blue flowers in early spring on an upright growing shrub, breathtaking in bloom; needs full sun and well-drained soil; very susceptible to mildew, prune to keep center open

### **Ornamental Features**

Persian Lilac features showy panicles of fragrant lilac purple flowers with sky blue overtones rising above the foliage in mid spring. The flowers are excellent for cutting. It has bluish-green deciduous foliage. The heart-shaped leaves do not develop any appreciable fall color.

### **Landscape Attributes**

Persian Lilac is a multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with an upright spreading habit of growth. Its relatively coarse texture can be used to stand it apart from other landscape plants with finer foliage.

This shrub will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. It is a good choice for attracting butterflies to your yard, but is not particularly attractive to deer who tend to leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

**Planting & Growing**

Persian Lilac will grow to be about 8 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 10 feet. It tends to be a little leggy, with a typical clearance of 2 feet from the ground, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years.

This shrub should only be grown in full sunlight. It is very adaptable to both dry and moist locations, and should do just fine under average home landscape conditions. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
