



Scout™ Maiden Grass

Description:

This non-invasive, infertile variety produces a large, elegant arching mound of green blades with white midribs; a striking cascade of soft pink plumes rise above the foliage in fall and mature to silvery-beige; provides great fall color

Ornamental Features

Scout Maiden Grass features bold plumes of shell pink flowers rising above the foliage in late summer. Its attractive grassy leaves are green in color with pointy white spines. As an added bonus, the foliage turns gorgeous shades of yellow, orange and red in the fall. The silver seed heads are carried on showy plumes displayed in abundance from early fall to late winter.

Landscape Attributes

Scout Maiden Grass is an herbaceous perennial grass with a shapely form and gracefully arching stems. Its medium texture blends into the garden, but can always be balanced by a couple of finer or coarser plants for an effective composition.

This plant will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Planting & Growing

Scout Maiden Grass will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 5 feet. It tends to be leggy, with a typical clearance of 1 foot from the ground, and should be underplanted with lower-growing perennials. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 20 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!

This plant does best in full sun to partial shade. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
