



Krzysztof Yew

Taxus x media 'Krzysztof'

Height: 5 feet

Spread: 18 inches

Description:

A narrow growing, columnar shrub with dense branching covered in narrow foliage that appears in whorls on the branchlets, exposing the gray undersides; a great accent for smaller spaces; takes pruning extremely well; loves shade

Ornamental Features

Krzysztof Yew is a dwarf conifer which is primarily valued in the landscape or garden for its rigidly columnar form. It has attractive green foliage with gray undersides which emerges chartreuse in spring. The ferny sprays of foliage are highly ornamental and remain green throughout the winter. The fruits are showy red drupes displayed from early to late fall.

Landscape Attributes

Krzysztof Yew is a dense multi-stemmed evergreen shrub with a narrowly upright and columnar growth habit. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other landscape plants with less refined foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub, and can be pruned at anytime. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Krzysztof Yew is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Mass Planting
- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use
- Topiary

Planting & Growing

Krzysztof Yew will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 18 inches. It has a low canopy with a typical clearance of 1 foot from the ground, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 50 years or more.

This shrub performs well in both full sun and full shade. However, you may want to keep it away from hot, dry locations that receive direct afternoon sun or which get reflected sunlight, such as against the south side of a white wall. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments, and will benefit from being planted in a relatively sheltered location. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone in winter to protect it in exposed locations or colder microclimates. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid, and parts of it are known to be toxic to humans and animals, so care should be exercised in planting it around children and pets.
