Description:

This is a dense, slow growing cushion or bun shaped evergreen shrub with upswept branching; adaptable and hardy; excellent choice for rock gardens and detail use in landscapes

Ornamental Features

Vassar Broom Norway Spruce is a dwarf conifer which is primarily valued in the landscape or garden for its interestingly mounded form. It has grayish green evergreen foliage. The needles remain grayish green throughout the winter.

Landscape Attributes

Vassar Broom Norway Spruce is a dense multi-stemmed evergreen shrub with a mounded form. It lends an extremely fine and delicate texture to the landscape composition which can make it a great accent feature on this basis alone.

This is a relatively low maintenance shrub. When pruning is necessary, it is recommended to only trim back the new growth of the current season, other than to remove any dieback. Deer don't particularly care for this plant and will usually leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Vassar Broom Norway Spruce is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Mass Planting
- Rock/Alpine Gardens
- General Garden Use

Planting & Growing

Vassar Broom Norway Spruce will grow to be about 4 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 4 feet. It tends to fill out right to the ground and therefore doesn't necessarily require facer plants in front. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for 50 years or more.

This shrub does best in full sun to partial shade. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. It is not particular as to soil type or pH, and is able to handle environmental salt. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
