Vanessa Passion Flower

Passiflora 'Vanessa'

Description:

One of the more spectacular vines for the garden; large, flowers with fuchsia pink petals and white filaments topped with lavender; wonderful for covering an arbor, trellis or lattice, the flowers are individually beautiful close up

Ornamental Features

Vanessa Passion Flower features showy lightly-scented fuchsia star-shaped flowers with lavender overtones, white eyes and white anthers at the ends of the branches from mid summer to mid fall. The flowers are excellent for cutting. Its compound leaves remain dark green in colour throughout the season.

Landscape Attributes

Vanessa Passion Flower is a multi-stemmed annual with a ground-hugging habit of growth. Its medium texture blends into the garden, but can always be balanced by a couple of finer or coarser plants for an effective composition.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It is a good choice for attracting butterflies to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Vanessa Passion Flower is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Accent
- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use

Planting & Growing

Vanessa Passion Flower will grow to be about 15 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 30 inches. As a climbing vine, it should either be planted near a fence, trellis or other landscape structure where it can be trained to grow upwards on it, or allowed to trail off a retaining wall or slope. Although it's not a true annual, this fast-growing plant can be expected to behave as an annual in our climate if left outdoors over the winter, usually needing replacement the following year. As such, gardeners should take into consideration that it will perform differently than it would in its native habitat.

This plant does best in full sun to partial shade. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. This plant should not require much in the way of fertilizing once established, although it may appreciate a shot of general-purpose fertilizer from time to time early in the growing season. It is not particular as to soil type, but has a definite preference for alkaline soils. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone in winter to protect it in exposed locations or colder microclimates. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
